

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RIGHT JUDGMENT

Let's face it, relationships are hard! Parents and children argue. Husbands and wives hurt each others. Best friends get angry at one another. People you love do things unfathomable to you. Being a Christian doesn't mean your relationship will be easy, but it does mean that there is hope in each and every relationship! In 1 Corinthians Paul writes to a church in conflict. As he speaks to them about their relational conflicts he speaks to us too.

Over the next few weeks we will look at how sin destroys relationship and how that should cause us to hate sin even more. We will discuss when it is appropriate to confront sin and when it is best to keep silent. We will learn that Christ is full of grace and truth and that we too must be grace and truth as we remove our logs in order to see clearly to clear the speck in our brother's eye. We will find that Jesus has come to reconcile us one to another, that it is not fitting for Christians to be in conflict, and that the only way to overcome our differences is through the cross. And yes, we will talk about those avoided but important topics, marriage and singleness.

In other words, we will talk about relationships. No man is an island unto himself. Married or single. Rich or poor. Asian or American. We are all relational people. Even lonely people have to struggle through relationships.

Relationships are hard...but Christ has called us to hard things. So press in a little harder to Christ and learn to love those difficult people in your life as they learn to love you.



THE PURPOSE OF JUDGMENT



READ THE FOLLOWING AND DISCUSS THE PURPOSE OF JUDGMENT:





One purpose of judgment is to bring repentance, but a second purpose is to ensure that Christ's bride remain pure. Read 1 Corinthians 5:6-8, 13 and discuss the following:

- What does Paul mean by, "a little leaven leavens the whole lump?"
- Often times we read this chapter with a focus on sexual sin, what other sin is included next to immorality? See v. 11, 6:9-11
- The "purge" language can be found all through Deuteronomy.

 Read the following verses and discuss the what "acceptable" sins

 might need to be purged from your life/group/church.



Titus 2:11-14

For the grace of God has appeared, bringing salvation for all people, 12 training us to renounce ungodliness and worldly passions, and to live self-controlled, upright, and godly lives in the present age, 13 waiting for our blessed hope, the appearing of the glory of our great God and Savior Jesus Christ, 14 who gave himself for us to redeem us from all lawlessness and to purify for himself a people for his own possession who are zealous for good works.

— THE EXCEPTION OF JUDGMENT —

Read 1 Corinthians 5:9-10, 12



- Why are we to not judge unbelievers?
- Where is the balance between loving unbelievers and not affirming their lifestyle?

What are some wrong ways the church has engaged unbelievers?

- Read John 17:15. How are we to be in the world but not of the world?
- Do you think the church struggles more with being in the world or of the world?
- 1 Corinthians 5:13 reminds us that unbelievers will one day be judged by God himself. How does this motivate us to speak the truth in love to our unbelieving friends?

Think of the extremes: affirming and condemning

REFLECTION:

Judgment is not a topic we like to discuss, but it is something that must be discussed. We are called upon to judge ourselves and continually be transformed by the power of the cross so that the judgment of the church will not take place. But if a brother or sister refuses to submit to the Lordship of Christ we the church have a responsibility to help them see the beauty of Christ and the ugliness of sin.

As you read 1 Corinthians 5 have you been challenged in any way?

Remember, we are not to remove ourselves from the world nor judge the world. We are to be as Jesus was...to love them and call them to repentance. How has your attitude toward unbelievers been?

PRAYER:

Close your time together in prayer for one another. What are some praises you want to thank God for? What are some needs you have this week? Pray Hebrews 11:24-26 over one another, that we would truly see Christ as a greater reward than the fleeting pleasures of sin.

Pray for your group to be missional this week, to reach out in love to the lost.

When I hear of disagreeable things amongst Christians, it brings an additional weight and burden on my spirit; I come to thee in my distress and make lamentable complaint; Teach me how to take reproofs from friends, even though I think I do not deserve them;

Use them to make me tenderly afraid of sin, more jealous over myself, more concerned to keep heart and life unblameable;





WHAT ARE SOME COMMON TYPES OF GRIEVANCES PEOPLE HAVE TODAY?







- Contrast wisdom in James 3:17-18 with "wisdom" in Corinth.







Paul is reminding us that we were guilty...such were some of you, but God has forgiven us...declared us NOT GUILTY...because of Jesus through the Holy Spirit.

Ephesians 4:32-5:2

And be kind to one another, tender-hearted, forgiving each other, just as God in Christ also has forgiven you. Therefore be imitators of God, as beloved children; and walk in love, just as Christ also loved you, and gave Himself up for us, an offering and a sacrifice to God as a fragrant aroma.

Forgiveness is when we strive against all thoughts of revenge; when we will not do our enemies mischief, but wish well to them, grieve at their calamities, pray for them, seek reconciliation with them, and show ourselves ready on all occasions to relieve them.

REFLECTION:

The more thou doest in love in me and by me, humble me the more; keep me meek, lowly, and always ready to give thee honour.



REFLECTION:
